New year, new mission and values

Over the last year, Visiting Nurse embarked on a strategic planning process. Through review, surveys and feedback we identified the need to review our mission statement and expand on the values that we hold dear as an organization. Visiting Nurse's Board of Directors, along with staff members, developed a new mission statement that explains our purpose. We are excited to announce our new mission statement:

Visiting Nurse provides compassion, comfort and guidance through life's journey.

It started with compassion. The dream was to create a home-like environment to provide compassionate care to patients as they faced the end of life and comfort to families as they said their goodbyes.

Visiting Nurse's leadership and Board of Directors rallied around this dream and 20 years ago, Hospice Home opened at 5910 Homestead Road in southwest Fort Wayne.

Our previous inpatient unit – the first of its kind in northeast Indiana – was located on the eighth floor of the old Lutheran Hospital, 3024 Fairfield Ave., in central Fort Wayne. When plans were announced in 1997 to tear down the former hospital, Visiting Nurse's leadership began planning for a free-standing hospice facility. Hospice Home broke ground in May 2000, and the facility opened in February 2001.

In the intervening years, Hospice Home has provided care and support for over 10,000 individuals ranging in age from 5 months to 103 years old.

The ripple of impact in our community from those over 10,000 individuals served is immense, as family and friends of those loved ones were also supported by Visiting Nurse. If you have had a loved one cared for at Hospice Home, you experienced the extended love and care that the Visiting Nurse team provided to your entire family.

A unique home away from home

Hospice Home is the only free-standing inpatient hospice care facility in northeast Indiana. The 14-bed unit is anchored by our nurses' station. There are also family gathering areas set up much like a living room in someone's home, plus a kitchen, sunroom, chapel-like


reflection room and conference areas as well. Family members and loved ones are welcome any time of day or night. Even through the pandemic, Visiting Nurse has ensured that family members are able to see their loved ones who are being cared for at Hospice Home. Staff put additional safety measures in place by checking family members temperatures, limiting the amount of family visiting at one time and providing masks as well.

Because Visiting Nurse is a locally based non-profit agency, we provide care to anyone, regardless of their ability to pay for services. Reimbursement rates for care at Hospice Home from Medicare/Medicaid and private insurance reimbursement rates do not reflect the true cost of providing this important care. Yet with your donations, we made sure that anyone who needed Hospice Home's specialized care was supported. In 2020, Visiting Nurse provided more than \$200,000 in charity care to those with no other means to pay for their care. Donations from people like you have ensured that no one goes without Visiting Nurse's specialized hospice and palliative care.

"A gentle landing place"



When Rick Farrant walked into Hospice Home in 2017 as his wife, Mary Hoffman, was being admitted, he had that "deer in the headlights" feeling – stunned, anxious and confused. Moments earlier, he had been at the hospital caring for Mary, who had fallen into a coma from liver disease. The beeping of monitors, the rushing feet and the bells calling for

service were replaced by the hush and homey feeling of Hospice Home.

"It was a surreal experience," Rick said. "I felt as if I was living someone else's life."

But the staff at Hospice Home projected an "air of calmness and dignity for the stricken," he said.

"The staff was compassionate, full of understanding and grace," Rick said. "They were sincerely dedicated to provide care."

In the days that followed, Rick kept vigil by Mary's side, often gazing out the window at the fountain in the gardens. "I kept wishing she would wake up to see the fountain," Rick said. "I wish she had experienced the warmth of the staff."

When he needed a minute to compose himself, he would walk through the gardens that surround Hospice Home, which provided him an escape from the end of Mary's life.

"The gardens gave me a measure of solace," he said, noting that even the garden volunteer who was "digging in the dirt was compassionate and understanding."

As kind and compassionate as the staff and volunteers were, "they didn't ignore reality," he added.

"Being by the side of a loved one as they slip away is a deeply personal and often somber experience that no one relishes," Rick said. "But I can't imagine what it would have been like for me and Mary in the absence of the grace offered by Visiting Nurse, which provided a gentle landing place for her final passage."

"Visiting Nurse provided that big sigh that everyone needs when they come to terms with reality," he added. "I was in a daze when I realized the only option left was hospice. Visiting Nurse was a godsend, and I will always think kindly of Hospice Home."

GET TO KNOW Amy Hernandes Registered Nurse Clinical Leader Hospice Home

When did γou begin working at Visiting Nurse?

I worked for Visiting Nurse from 2012-2014, left to pursue NICU nursing, and returned in October 2018.

2 What drew you to hospice work?

My grandmother passed away at the age of 60 with metastatic breast cancer. She was able to die peacefully at home with hospice services. Our family was really impacted by the compassionate care she received.

What's something people don't realize about dying?

It can be a really beautiful thing, equally as beautiful as birth, in my opinion. After people and their families have fought a long battle with disease and they finally are able to resign to the peace that they don't have to struggle any longer, that things are going to be all right. Those beautiful moments are what keep me here. It's the good stuff that shines through the sadness of the separation death brings.

4 How do γou recharge and relax?

I live for time with my family! My husband and my son are my world. They both entertain and inspire me. We try to make the most of vacations and weekends to connect.

What is your secret talent? I write songs on occasion. I won a state award in high school for a song I wrote. 6 Who is your heroes?

My parents. They are just great people. They are tough, strong, successful, inspiring. I like to think I got some of the better of the two of them. My mom is a nurse; my dad is a businessperson... very people-oriented folks.

Hospice Home turns 20 this γear. Why is it important to have an inpatient facility like Hospice Home?

Hospice Home is a true gem! We have lost both of my in-laws in the last 2 years. They were both put in comfort care while in ICU's, and remained here until they passed. My husband has said many times, he wished they had had access to a place like Hospice Home. The expertise of our physicians, the opportunity for a peaceful, private room with nearly immediate access to spiritual and social support, music therapy...we offer a great service to this community! It's really something to be proud of!

- What is important to your patients at the end of life? I think peace, comfort, family/loved ones' support. Those are what people tend to seek in their last days.
- What is something nobody knows about you?
 I'm a pretty awesome cook! My best dishes are spur of the moment stuff that I make up as I go.

I have had 1 patient that I'll never forget, "Jerry." I just connected with him and his family immediately. He was really sick, but you could tell he had always been a strong man, worked hard for his family. It was apparent they adored him. His disease was difficult. He went through a lot, but he was so kind and encouraging to his family right to the end. He rarely complained of the pain and bleeding he suffered. Just unforgettable.
