

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
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A Wonderful Life



Roger Herman's life has had many twists and turns. The 85-year-old veteran was born in New York City and even though he hasn't lived in the Big Apple since 1970, he retains his "New Yawk" accent. An Army medic during the Korean War, Herman turned to engineering when he left the service. He and his late wife, Patricia, had four kids: Steve, Peter, Susan and Julie. Today, Herman's journey has led him to a white house near the University of Saint Francis. He's able to

live at home despite advanced kidney disease, thanks to the supportive care he receives from Visiting Nurse.

"Hospice is clearly blessed," Herman said. His nurse case manager has been "flat-out honest and open," with Herman.

"I ask questions and she tells me like it is," he added. "You've got a good team working there."

That team includes the Rev. Bob Eickmann, who provides spiritual counseling. Herman was born Jewish but converted to Lutheranism as an adult. He said he was a "broken" man and had a conversation with God, in which he turned his problems over to the higher power.

"When I did that, this great peace came over me," he said. "I'm no longer worried. I'm not religious but I have a lot of faith."

Spiritual counseling is one of the many facets of hospice care that's supported by people just like you. Your donations to Visiting Nurse allow us to provide non-denominational spiritual care, counseling with social workers, grief counseling with bereavement specialists and music therapy to express complex emotions through music. All of these patient services are provided thanks to people like you who donate to the Visiting Nurse Foundation.

Herman also benefits from the gift of time hospice has given him.

"In this last phase of life, I've been given the gift of time to pause and reflect," he said.

Dear friends -

As I reflect back on 2019, I am amazed at the many good and exciting changes Visiting Nurse has experienced, thanks to the dedication of our generous supporters. It was definitely a year of growth for the agency,

as we embarked on a partnership with Family LifeCare, a non-profit hospice agency based in Berne, Indiana. We anticipate the collaboration to be completed by March 1, when Family LifeCare will come under the Visiting Nurse umbrella. This joining of agencies will add three more counties to Visiting Nurse's geographic range in Indiana: Blackford, Grant and Jay counties, including the cities of Marion, Portland and Hartford City. We have found that we share the same values and mission focus as Family LifeCare, and we anticipate a smooth transition for both agencies.

We are thrilled to be able to partner with Dupont Hospital to offer outpatient palliative care services on the northside of Fort Wayne. Palliative care allows for patients and families to feel supported as they face serious illnesses and make decisions on their next steps in care. The goal is to improve quality of life for patients and families. Patients can still be undergoing curative treatment while receiving support through the Visiting Nurse's Palliative Care Clinic at Dupont Hospital.

We have seen growth in all our service lines, including grief support, home health and hospice and palliative care. This has only been possible because of the generous support of people like you. How long have γou been with Visiting
Nurse and what have some of γour jobs
been here?

On October 30th, it was 19 years at Visiting Nurse. I started out as a nurse case manager at Hospice Home and worked there for more than 16 years, then transferred to Quality Improvement.

How did γou get into nursing?

I wanted to move to Fort Wayne and I applied at a local nursing home as an orderly/nursing assistant. The Director called me the next day for an interview and I started work the job one week later. After a few weeks of working and enjoying taking care of the residents, I realized nursing is something I wanted to do as a career.

What do γου like about γουν current position?

Autonomy and keeping up with reports and project deadlines.

If you could have a super-power,

 Shape Shifter – It just would be really,

really fun !!

- What's something people would be surprised to know about γου?
 Nothing in my life would surprise anyone.
- What do you do for fun?
 Working out in my yard. Taking care of my peacocks and aquariums.

If you could have lunch with anyone, living or dead, who would you choose and why?

Myself at age 18, to hear my views and what I had viewed as important at that age. Maybe slap the young me up the side of the head. I'd also want to have lunch with myself prior to death. I would like to hear what I feel is really important in life at that age compared to now, and how I feel about the dying process. Maybe get slapped up the side of the head by the old me for what I view now as important.

8 Why did you choose to come to Visiting Nurse?

I was a homecare case manager for 7 years for a home care company that provided hospice-like services. Since it was home care, most insurance companies did not approve social work visits, and we did not have a chaplain. I had several patients who were dying, and I was the only one available to provided emotional support to the patients/families. I found this area of nursing very rewarding and I jumped on the opportunity when a position opened up at Hospice Home.

9 What have γour patients taught γου?

I learned by listening as they talk about their life and how they are dealing with dying. Through this I realized that every patient has something to give, whether it be knowledge or just a smile. Even the most difficult patients have taught me to be patient and understanding as they try desperately to hold onto their independence.

What have been the biggest changes you've seen at Visiting Nurse since you started working here?
The growth of Visiting Nurse and the increased number of services being offered to patients and families.

Palliative Care Clinic to Open at Dupont Hospital

On February 17, Visiting Nurse will open a Palliative Care Clinic at Dupont Hospital. The clinic, staffed by physicians and nurse practitioners, will be located at 2514 E. Dupont Road, Suite 120, on the Dupont Hospital campus.

Palliative medicine is a patient- and family-centered type of care, provided by physicians and nurse practitioners, for those facing serious and chronic illnesses. Palliative medicine addresses physical, emotional and social needs to help patient autonomy, access to information and choice of treatment. Palliative medicine also focuses on providing relief from the symptoms and stresses of a serious illness. The goal is to improve quality of life for patients and families. Patients can still be undergoing curative treatment while receiving support through the Palliative Care Clinic.


The Palliative Care Clinic team helps patients manage symptoms including pain, neuropathy, anxiety, nausea, shortness of breath, weakness, fatigue and others. Also included in the Palliative Care program are goals-of-care conversations and advance care planning discussions, both of which are helpful for patients and families.

"Visiting Nurse is excited to provide Palliative Care to patients and families in need. This new location will be beneficial for patients who live throughout the northeast Indiana region and need this specialized level of care," said Visiting Nurse CEO Leslie Friedel. Common diagnoses that qualify for Visiting Nurse's Palliative Care Clinic include cancer, congestive heart failure, cirrhosis, COPD, renal disease, dementia, HIV/AIDS, pulmonary fibrosis, stroke and degenerative nervous system diseases such as Parkinson's disease or amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS).

Dupont Hospital CEO Lorenzo Suter said "Of the any initiatives that Dupont Hospital has launched since my arrival in 2017, I am so very pleased to have the Palliative Care team at Visiting Nurse join our campus. The Visiting Nurse team has a compassionate

approach to helping patients and families who are facing challenging circumstances and situations. Palliative Care access is needed in Northeast Indiana and I am thankful for Visiting Nurse's commitment to providing such a valuable service."
