One of the biggest changes in Visiting Nurse history took place on March 1st, when our name changed to Stillwater Hospice. We do not take this change lightly: since 1900, our name has changed numerous times but "Visiting Nurse"

was always a part of our identity. We have chosen Stillwater Hospice as our identity moving forward to better reflect what the agency we know and love has developed into.

We chose "Stillwater" because our families often describe a sense of peace and calm once our services are in place. We chose "Hospice" to better reflect our core service line which is hospice service at home and hospice service that takes place at Hospice Home.

Over time, our services have evolved, as have the communities we serve. Recognizing the range of services we provide and the diversity of patients, families and partners we serve—we believe our new name will help us be even more successful as we deliver compassion, guidance and care for those facing life-limiting illnesses and their families.

What is changing?

Our name, logo and marketing materials will change, along with items where those elements are present—including apparel, signage, office materials, and so on. The new logo reflects a water lily floating on the three rivers of northeast Indiana. Water lilies can only bloom in still water, which is what we strive to provide our families – a calmness and peace during a difficult time of life so that meaningful moments can be shared with loved ones.

What is not changing?

We will always lead with love—the compassion, comfort and guidance we provide through life's journey is our enduring mission. Our personal and team commitment to delivering these services with passion, empathy and dedication is resolute and unwavering.

This work was guided by a local brand consulting firm and led by our board of directors with the guidance of a special "Brand Champions" committee that was made up of individuals from across Visiting Nurse. We believe the new name will help us achieve the goals outlined in our strategic plan, adopted by our board of directors in 2020.

Dreaming and Drawing




There is an instantly familiar statue in Headwaters Park that depicts Chief Little Turtle, standing at the banks of the St. Marys River. His gaze over the park is strong and steady, not unlike that of his creator, famed sculptor Hector Garcia. Hector's work in bronze can be seen all around

Fort Wayne, from the intricate history of Fort Wayne depicted at Citizens Square, to the series of busts of famed citizens that grace the campus of Purdue Fort Wayne.

Hector's work is widely known, as he has created Fort Wayne's and Indiana's Bicentennial Medals, as well as creating 22 busts of famous area leaders, which are now housed at Purdue University Fort Wayne. His Freedom Flame medallion is part of the Smithsonian permanent collection and was presented to Desmond Tutu in the mid 1980s. Today, he has plans to create a life-size Johnny Appleseed, his final gift to Fort Wayne. Hector and his family are receiving supportive services from Stillwater Hospice (formerly Visiting Nurse) to help Hector get stronger. This specialized care comes thanks to donors like you!

An associate professor emeritus of fine arts, Hector taught sculpture and figure drawing



from 1976 to 1997. He first taught with the Fort Wayne Art Institute, followed by IPFW after the merger with Indiana University. A nationally and internationally recognized sculptor, Hector received a B.F.A. in sculpture from The John Herron Institute in Indianapolis and an M.F.A. from Indiana University. He also completed special scholarship work at the Instituto Allende in Mexico.

Hector began sculpting after his grandmother would give him melted candle wax that he shaped and molded. He grew up in the Bronx and graduated from the Herron Art School in Indianapolis in 1966. "I came because the art school (Fort Wayne Art Institute) needed a sculptor," he said.

Hector has completed hundreds of sculptures and commissioned works during his prolific career. He has produced medals and medallions for award ceremonies in Helsinki, Finland; Takaoka, Japan; Gera, Germany; Plosk, Poland; and London, England.

Collections of his work are owned by notable individuals throughout the country including Ted Turner, Ray Bradbury, Herbie Hancock, Chris Schenkel, Bob Knight, Gene Keady, Richard Lugar, and Lance Armstrong, according to news reports.



Piero Garcia, one of Hector and his wife Carol's two surviving children (the family also includes daughter Avila and the late son Carlo, who passed away a year ago, plus five grand-children), says his dad has always been driven to create beautiful and meaningful works of art. Carol, too, is an artist,

and her paintings decorate the couple's Fort Wayne home. The couple has been married for more than 64 years.

Because Hector is receiving supportive services from Stillwater Hospice, his symptoms are managed well, and he's been able to continue to dream and draw. Piero, who lives out of town, feels confident in his dad's care from Stillwater Hospice. He and Avila are able to create lasting memories with their parents because their medical needs are being met by his care team, which include Amanda Hug, RN, aides Yolanda Cuazitl and Tami Towns, along with social worker Paige Jones. The wraparound care provided by this caring team means Hector and his family can enjoy time together, creating lasting memories and beautiful art.

Practically everyone who has had a loved one cared for at Hospice Home over the years has benefited from the calm wisdom of nurse Terrie Trout, who served at Hospice Home before it even opened on Homestead Road 21 years ago. And though she retired in 2017, she was unable to stay away, and she began volunteering four months later.

As a volunteer, she has greeted visitors at Hospice Home, made admission packets, stuffed envelopes and done some computer work for the admission department and even sat with a patient who was restless.

"I've helped in the grief center shredding paper. So even in volunteering there is variety, which I've enjoyed," she said. "I just try to be a help wherever I can. I know firsthand what the staff does, I've worked with them, been in the trenches with them. I know what a difference a volunteer can make. I remember back when a volunteer would say, 'oh, but I didn't do that much.' Yet I know what a difference they made. Everyone is a valuable - and needed- part of the team."

Now that she's had four years as a volunteer, Terrie realized volunteering at Visiting Nurse (now Stillwater Hospice) is perfect for this stage of her life.


